Registration is open for The Creative Center at University Settlement's 2021 Training Institute

Virtual program taking place in November will engage artists and administrators in Creative Aging and Healthcare best practices

New York, NY – Artists and healthcare administrators are invited to participate in The Creative Center at University Settlement's 2021 Training Institute, <u>registration for which is now open</u>. Applications must be submitted by September 30, 2021.

In the training, which will take place from November 1 – 22, national leaders in the field of Creative Aging will train participants to replicate The Creative Center's recognized best practices model.

The training, funded by the National Endowment for the Arts and the NYC Department of Cultural Affairs, will focus on the role of the arts in healthcare and creative aging, engaging practitioners with effective practices for implementing and sustaining high-quality arts programming in settings including community and senior centers, hospitals, nursing homes and long-term care facilities, as well as rehabilitative, palliative, and hospice settings.

"The Creative Center recognizes that arts and health spaces are rife with racial and economic inequity," said TCC Director **Sophia Heinecke**. "Throughout November's training, we will welcome the opportunity to interrogate these topics during every presentation."

Registration for the Training Institute costs \$350 per selected trainee. <u>Apply here</u>. Artists and administrators working NYC (including through SU CASA, senior centers, etc) may apply for and receive a discounted rate of \$250. Several scholarships are available. **People of color are particularly encouraged to apply.**
