University Settlement awarded \$148,500 by the New York State Council on the Arts

New York, NY - University Settlement announced today a grant totaling \$148,500 from the New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA) to support the recovery of the nonprofit arts and culture sector. Following New York State's \$105 million in the arts for FY2022, NYSCA has awarded more than \$80 million since June 2021.

NYSCA funding will be used to support both of of University Settlement's arts programs:

- <u>The Performance Project</u>, which engages young local artists alongside emerging and established professional artists with opportunities to connect, create, and publicly present new work.
- <u>The Creative Center</u>, which engages people with cancer, chronic illnesses, and aging-related complications with opportunities to discover how making art can create positive distractions and deepen a person's sense of self.

"We are grateful to NYSCA for its support of our arts programs," said **Melissa Aase, CEO of University Settlement**. "The arts give people the space to explore feelings, build selfawareness, and cope with challenges; they bring us together, and they give us the opportunity to become our best selves. University Settlement is committed to making sure our neighbors can participate in free or low-cost art-making activities; it's central to our mission."
